Don Sibson and Dan Saliga Take Frying Pan Honors

The Two-Man Frying Pan Race on Friday night, September 1st, drew 16 competitors to race twice around Welch Island. The eight boat racing fleet got off first into a dying 5 – 8 knot westerly followed five minutes later by the eight cruising boats. Looking east some 45 minutes later, boats began to appear from around the backside of Welch Island. They were to proceed back to the starting line and then turn and go back around Welch in the opposite direction. By this time the breeze had all but disappeared so Race Committee put up the "S" flag shortening the race to just the initial time around the island. Don Sibson was in the lead as the boats approached the shortened finish line. He managed to keep his Laser 28, Coherent moving in the very light breeze and crossed the finish some hour and three minutes after starting. One by one the next five racing boats withdrew before finishing. But the cruising fleet, sitting a bit further back up the course, re-

ceived a short lived increase in breeze lasting long enough to get each of them over the finish line. Dan Saliga's Lily Pad took the first place after PHRF correction over Haleakala's line honors first to finish.

Congratulations to this year's winners Coherent and Lily Pad. They will have their names inscribed on the respective Racing and Cruising "Frying Pan" trophies that are on permanent display at Fay's Boat Yard Chandlery.

Youth Sailing Program

End of Summer Report

Ed. Note: The following are excerpts from Meg's final report for the season.

This year has by far been the most successful summer for the program in recent memory and I can only hope that we will continue to see this type of enthusiasm for youth sailing in the region.

Enrollment reached an all time high this summer with 107 students filling 125 slots. Many of the mid to late season inquiries were the result of positive word of mouth from already enrolled campers. We had many neighbors, siblings, and cousins contact us and join in on the fun and learning.

The Junior Club has reached new heights in participation and activity this summer. The doublehanded fleet has re-ignited the enthusiasm of many of our older juniors and the Opti kids are looking forward to the day when they are old enough to sail the "big kids' boats". During the second half of the summer, Wednesday night races have boasted fleets of up to 12 Lasers and we have often had all six 420s out on the race course as well. Fifteen youth racers competed in Lasers, Optimists, and 420s at the WYC Commodores Cup Regatta in July. The event not only provided a great competitive opportunity for our racers, but also proved to be an amazing source of publicity. Full color pictures of Lasers and 420s made front pages of the *Concord Sunday Monitor* and the *Laconia Citizen*. The *Citizen* also featured a sports article on the regatta that mentioned several youth sailors. In addition to print coverage, the juniors were interviewed for "Out and About", a local kid's television program. The team has done some traveling off the lake this summer as well. In addition to the Bemis Western Regionals in July, the athletes attended



the D-7 Laser Radial Championships in Rockport, Massachusetts. To assure their continued success, development, and devotion to the sport, the team could use a full time coach and advisor. A separate coach for the race team would allow the juniors to travel to more off lake regattas and clinics. The Junior Club is also interested in hosting several events next season.

The full day, one-week sessions have continued to serve us well and they should be continued. However, the 8:30 to 4:30 day is far too long for many of the younger children. The same amount of material can be covered in a 7-hour day. Racing classes may elect to go longer depending on the age and ability of the kids. There needs to be some changes in how we place children. Instead of having parents place their children by age, I suggest we place campers by height and weight. The placement mailers sent to parents will in-

clude not only class level but type boat as well. Assuming 8 sailors in all beginning Opti classes, 12 sailors in all 420 classes and 6-7 sailors in the more advanced Optimist classes, a full schedule next season should provide the potential for 169 slots.

The next logical step in the continued growth of our fleet would be the addition of two more Optimists. The acquisition of these boats is financially feasible as we would be able to accommodate 25 more sailors, realizing an additional \$4875 in registrations. A new Club Optimist retails for just under \$2400. Should we purchase more Optis, we will also need to acquire another safety boat to keep ratios within recommended parameters. In the interest of keeping our older sailors excited and involved, at least two of the 420s need to be outfitted for spinnakers and trapezes.

J80 Fleet #1 Concludes its Summer Race Series

The summer series of one design racing between the lake's J80 fleet proved to be as exciting as the spring series. Many of the boats showed marked improvement as the session proceeded into late August. In the end Jeff Kirchoff and Kevin Hayes on Gostosa proved to be the Boat of the Year, winning the series by a healthy margin of points over the second place finisher, Blues Power. The enthusiasm within the fleet is exemplified best by five of the fleet's boats that must motor at least one hour to each Thursday night race and then back home as darkness falls. The final results of the summer series are shown on this page.

2000 J-Jamboree North

On Wednesday, September 13th, the weather forecast was for "rain all day" on Saturday and showers on Sunday. Couple the weather threat with the fact that the J/80 North American Championships were held the week before and the result was only two traveling J/80's making the trip for the 13th annual J-Jamboree North. This was the fifth year with J/80's in the fleet. Thanks to the more hardy J/24 fleet that produced nine traveling boats along with two local boats for their District Championships.

I arrived at Fays Boat Yard shortly after Noon on Friday in a heavy downpour. There was one J/80 and several J/24's that had already arrived. The rain stopped about a half hour later. Then the sun came out for a preview of what was to be for the next two days.

As I came up "the broads" by powerboat Saturday morning, the breeze was already a steady 13-15 knots out of the Northwest with whitecaps and a building chop. The breeze moderated into the low teens in the early afternoon then built back up by 4 PM as the last race finished. We caught our best and longest plane just after the downwind finish of that last race. The Laconia airport was recording steady breeze around 16-17 knots by then.

The weary but exhilarated fleet retired to the Winnepesaukee Yacht Club where the Budweiser Beer Truck was strategically stationed. We had a social hour followed by a terrific dinner prepared by club members. A brief auction was

held with some strong competition among the crews for winning bids.

Sunday started with breeze in the low-teens from the WSW and little or no chop. We sailed four more races with the breeze diminishing. The final J/24 race was abandoned at the weather mark while the J/80's continued to finish a once-around course.
