As George Peppard used to say on the TV show A-TEAM, "I love it when a plan comes together." That phrase is never far from my thoughts after a well executed mark rounding. On fully crewed spinnaker fleet boats the exhilaration is even more rewarding with every crew member doing their particular task in perfect concert while in the midst of competitors. Tactics, rules, physical strength, delicate timing must be perfect. Even on a losing day, a good mark rounding or spinnaker set can be the gratification each crew member seeks, and be thought of and talked about, long after the results of the particular race or regatta have faded from memory.

In the non-spinnaker fleet with usually less experienced or short handed crews the challenge can seem equally as formidable and the achievement equally as rewarding especially when the wind builds above the range

### Sail to All Night Victories in "The Around the Lake Race"

Under sunny skies and 15-18 knot winds out of the Northwest, the 1992 Around the Lake Race started promptly at 6:00 PM off the South end of Welch Island. The course was upwind to Meredith, then marks at Wolfeboro, Center Harbor, Alton, and back home to the finish at Welch for Racing Class. Cruising Class had the same course with the exception of rounding Parker Island instead of going to Alton.

As dusk approached, the winds lightened and the moon appeared making for an enjoyable evening of light air sailing. Major wind shifts occurred causing constant changing of sails. The rounding mark at Wolfeboro

Bay was removed from its location causing minor confusion. All sailors did a great job of "guesstimating" the mark's former location and rounding it properly!

Sometime around midnight *Impatient* with "New Dad," Ed Philpot, at the helm grabbed the lead from the bigger and supposedly faster boats and never looked back. With patience, *Impatient's* crew made many proper course decisions and took charge of their class as they were first to finish—1:21 minutes ahead of *Polish Princess*. ## *"Around the Lake Race" Review*

Changes need to be made! For many years there has been much outstanding sailing on the big part of the Lake while absolutely impossible sailing existed due to lack of wind at turning points like Meredith, Center Harbor and Alton Bay. 1993 may be the beginning of a new chapter in the long life of the Lake Winnepesaukee "All Nite Race."

As Race Committee Co-Chairman, and with the approval and support of the officers of the LWSA, I propose that we race "out where the wind is!" We can still sail to most points of the Lake while staying away from those awful airless holes.

On another issue—I feel we must do more island rounding or lighted buoy roundings as the Department of Safety will not allow unattended marks to be left out overnight. They are a hazard to navigation. The one buoy I set this year (off Brewster Academy, Wolfeboro) was removed and placed inside the School's mooring field.

A 60-70 mile course can be maintained using lighted buoys and islands such as Parker, Moose, Three Mile, Five Mile, Lockes and Welch. We'll stay in the better air and get more sailing and less drifting.

## *"Around the Lake Race" Review Review*

I agree with Brad's changes and propose a couple of more which I think should make the race more appealing to a wide variety of sailors.

After talking with many sailors, I have come to the conclusion that the "overnight" part of the tradition makes the race harder than it should be. If we

make sure all boats are off the Lake by 1:00 AM, we would make it a late night affair. The sleep you can get afterwards prevents the following Sunday from being a bust. So as RCOD of this race in 1993 I propose the following:

1. We start the race at noon.
2. Using radios we keep track of

the leaders and adjust the course, based on PHRF so that everyone is done by 1:00 AM.

3. We have a nice breakfast on Sunday and award the trophies!

I believe if we make these modifications, coupled with Brad's suggestions, we will have a much more enjoyable race with many more participants!

of your headsail and changing down is a very costly option.

For five seasons now the LWSA has been going the extra effort to set courses using marks. Yet in the last few years an number of races have reverted back to the practice of years past of using islands and other fixed geographical points on the Lake as turning marks. I've heard grumbling that going around islands isn't "real racing," or that we will all ruin our keels trying to cut an island too close. I've heard myself grumble as *Mischief Maker* sits in a wind hole next to some island and gives up a hard fought lead.

Is one type of course better than another? No more so than apples are better than oranges. It's true that the preponderance of literature on the subject deals with moveable buoy courses which are shifted with variations of wind direction. The racing rules don't give specific instructions for island roundings. We are all geared to trying to duplicate the environment we see in J-Boat videos or America's Cup competition. And there are some days when there isn't enough wind to even get to an island. Yet, to try and insulate our racing from our lake sailing environment is, I believe, a mistake. We would be giving up the opportunity to build a valuable skill.

Look at the charts of most racing areas, even most inland lakes. They do not look much like Winnepesaukee. The glacier that came through here

left all those islands right out in the middle. They get in the way of the gradient wind, and create their own mini-wind environments which can appear and disappear with slight variations of wind direction and speed. I've noticed over the years when sailing off the lake that the average ocean sailor is much less sensitive to small wind variations. It's true that we don't have to deal much with currents and navigation, but our Lake is teaching us valuable lessons just because we have become so used to watching for wind patterns.

This is where we have chosen to sail and to race. We can complain about all those apparent anomalies and try to keep our race course sheltered from them out in the broads, or we can take on the challenge of learning about them and include them as part of our racing skill. After a while the wind holes and pockets start to make sense. Then one day the plan comes together and you pick up 25 boat lengths on the guy that owes you a lot of time, just because you played the shift around an island just right. Do it consistently, and they'll be talking about changing your rating.

Aboard *Mischief Maker*, we still have a long way to go, but each time we sail we try to learn the lessons of the day. Of our successes and of our failures because there are always both, on either type of course. The challenge successfully met is its own reward. The challenge avoided brings no reward. Which type of course do we like better? Some days we have apples, other days we like oranges.
